Overview of issues and priorities

Dear Mr. S. Morel,

Given the dramatically dwindling lake levels in East Africa and after consultation with my colleagues in the region and the Hague, it is my intention to request a SEA in support of the possible definition of a strategy to address this issue.

As a first step, I would like to request the EIA Commission to advise on guidelines for the SEA, including a problem analysis, the design of the process and a framework for the SEA. At this stage, the problem analysis in particular is essential.

For this first step, I request the Commission to involve the colleagues listed under cc in the e-mail to which letter this is attached and to take the issues and priorities in the attachment as the starting point.

On the basis of the resulting guidelines, I will decide together with the colleagues in the cc-list on requesting one (or more) SEA(s) and by whom. With regard to the planning, I would like to propose a quick start given the urgency of some of the issues. I suggest a phased approach

(starting with the priority issues) starting no later than May 1 2006, with a

total duration of about 12 months, of which about 3 months for the guidelines (depending also on time made available by partners) and about 7 months for

the SEA. This would allow time for an evaluation of the SEA within the year.

APPENDIX 2

Project Information

The course of water levels of the Nile Equatorial lakes shows much variations in time, illustrating the large climate variability in the region. During the early sixties, water levels rose in nearly all Lakes due to a number of consecutive extremely wet years. In the past five years the water levels of the lakes fell dramatically. The lakes support a series of economic activities that, due to the falling levels have come under stress.

Proposed Activity:

The Netherlands embassies in the Nile riparian countries requested the Netherlands Commission for Environmental Assessment (NCEA) to analyse whether in the long run there is a problem with the lake levels. If the answer to that question would be affirmative, the embassies intended to invite riparian governments to formulate (with the help of a Strategic Environmental Assessment) a strategy to mitigate the problem and/or cope with its consequences.
